

The Harvey Prize in Science and Technology is awarded to Professor Paul B. Corkum In recognition of his seminal contributions to the field of attosecond science, enabling resolving electronic motion in atoms and molecules. For more than two decades, he has been a leader and pioneer in the field of ultrafast laser spectroscopy, generating powerful insights and experiments. Prof. Corkum 's ability to create intuitive models for very complex phenomena played the key role in establishing attosecond spectroscopy.
